## A message from Rabbi Harry Rosenfeld

In her book The Case For God, Karen Armstrong writes (2009, p. 10):

"Before the modern period, most men and women were naturally inclined to religion and they were prepared to work at it. Today many of us are no longer willing to make this effort, so the old myths seem arbitrary, remote and incredible.

"Like art, the truths of religion require the disciplined cultivation of different modes of consciousness."

To paraphrase: religion, and more specifically religious belief is hard and, Reform Judaism is harder still. Why? I believe it is because religion is a moving target. It swings from "There are no atheists in foxholes", to God has no impact on this world, God does not exists. We turn to religion when we have needs, when we confront the ultimate questions, when we are lost, and periodically when we rejoice. Conversely, we reject religion when we have needs, when we confront the ultimate questions, when we are lost, and periodically when we rejoice. Most often we find ourselves in the middle.

I have been thinking about someone I know who, when presented with a cancer diagnosis with a prognosis that they would soon die, s/he rejected God because, God had let the cancer bring her/him close to death. When his/her treatment was successful beyond possibility, it was thanks to the doctors. S/he gave absolutely no thought that God might have influenced the cure. To maintain her/his faith in the face of illness was too hard. To regain his/her faith in the light of being cancer free, was also just too hard.

His/her theology is not mine. I do not believe that God allowed the cancer, nor do I believe that God cured him/her. I have wrestled for decades evolving my religious beliefs and it has been hard. I neither blame God for the lows in my life, nor do I give God the credit for the highs. I believe that God created this world and for that I am and will be grateful for as long as I am alive.

Why is Reform Judaism even harder? Because we do not "enforce" a particular theology or particular practices and beliefs on each other. As Reform Jews we are called up to confront our beliefs head on, while accepting that the beliefs of others may be correct.

We, especially in the Western World, live in a society that values that which is easy. But religion has always been hard.

To paraphrase Rabbi Amnon of Mainz: To do religion, we need to join hands and find our individual and communal paths together, supporting each other and challenging each other.

Since then, the Rabbi Search Committee has been busy doing interviews and down-selecting candidates to get to a finalist. The Rabbi Search Committee is expected to provide a recommendation to the Board by the beginning of January.

That will kick off my part as the Board reviews the recommendation and decides who we should hire. Whoever it is, I'll be busy in January helping to negotiate the contract for our next Rabbi. I expect that, in February, we'll be able to have a Special Membership Meeting via Zoom to introduce the new Rabbi and ask the membership to vote on acceptance of this Rabbi. If approved, I'll complete the contract with our next Rabbi, and we'll start the process of helping them move to Albuquerque.

Keep an eye out for our communications as we solidify plans for the Special Membership Meeting. I want to thank the Rabbi Search Committee and everyone on the Advisory Group for such excellent work during this search. I believe we have a great future in front of us with our next Rabbi.

I wish each and every one of you a wonderful and healthy 2021. Please stay safe during this ongoing pandemic until we can all get the vaccine.

Consider planting a tree or shrub in honor of Tu B'Shvat. This year the Jewish New Year of the Trees will be January 28th. Although it may be a little early to plant a drought tolerant specie, this is a great time to think about where you can plant a tree or shrub in the spring that will be a low water user and provide food for birds, bees and other pollinators. Winter is always a good time to survey your yard for future planting.

#### Here are just a few small tree and shrub options:

- Desert Willow (bees and hummingbirds)
- Western Serviceberry (birds)
- Cotoneaster (birds)
- Lavender (bees)
- Yellow Bird of Paradise (bees)
- Western Sand Cherry (birds)
- New Mexico Olive (birds and bees)
